The second new sampler reproduction was made by Fanny Forister in New England, and features two sweet saltbox style houses with naturalistic trees and flowers between them.

The new "half" sampler is a re-release of Nancy Nurse, from the Danvers Historical Society, including new genealogical information tracing her ancestry back to Rebecca Nurse who was hanged as a witch in Salem in 1692.

In the early eighteenth century samplers began to evolve from long vertical bands into more rectangular shapes. They began to incorporate more pictorial and scenic images and scenes such as those found on seventeenth century canvas and stumpwork pictures. Alphabets, numerals and verses prevailed but the sampler evolved both as an exercise in needlework technique as well as a vehicle for

creative artistic expression. Common themes were scenes based on biblical stories, but the popularity of bucolic, pastoral scenes increased. Mary Hammand's sampler/canvas work piece melds these themes with a traditional sampler at the center surrounded by pastoral images on either side of it.



Nancy Nurse was born to Polly/Molly James. and Rogers Nurse in Danvers, Massachusetts on June 19th, 1798. Her sampler, stitched in 1807 when she was nine years old was worked on a dark green linsey Woolsey ground unique to samplers of certain regions of New England made before 1832. Nancy

Nurse is a direct descendent of Rebecca Towne Nurse who was executed for witchcraft by the government of the Province of Massachusetts Bay in New England in 1692, during the Salem with trials. Learn more about her history on the Scarlet Letter website.
